

## CCSS Literacy K-5 Informational Text CARDS

**DIRECTIONS:** Cut out all the cards on both pages and mix up the order. Have participants sort the cards into the three header card categories: **Key Ideas and Details**, **Craft and Structure**, and **Integration of Knowledge and Ideas**. Keep a master of these original two pages as the “answer key.”

Quote accurately from a text when explaining what the text says explicitly and when drawing inferences from the text.	Determine the meaning of general academic and domain-specific words and phrases in a text relevant to a <i>grade 5 topic or subject area</i> .	Draw on information from multiple print or digital sources, demonstrating the ability to locate an answer to a question quickly or to solve a problem efficiently.

Distinguish between information provided by pictures or other illustrations and information provided by the words in a text.	Identify basic similarities in and differences between two texts on the same topic (e.g., in illustrations, descriptions, or procedures).
Describe the connection between a series of historical events, scientific ideas or concepts, or steps in technical procedures in a text.	Identify the main purpose of a text, including what the author wants to answer, explain, or describe.	Compare and contrast the most important points presented by two texts on the same topic.
Describe the relationship between a series of historical events, scientific ideas or concepts, or steps in technical procedures in a text, using language that pertains to time, sequence, and cause/effect.	Distinguish their own point of view from that of the author of a text.	Compare and contrast the most important points and key details presented in two texts on the same topic.
Explain events, procedures, ideas, or concepts in a historical, scientific, or technical text, including what happened and why, based on specific information in the text. Analyze multiple accounts of the same event or topic, noting important similarities and differences in the point of view they represent.	Integrate information from several texts on the same topic in order to write or speak about the subject knowledgeably.
